Regional Oral History Archives as an Honors Program Practice <i>In Fall 2023, select faculty at Columbia College piloted an interdisciplinary honors course that taught students how to contextualize and preserve regional oral histories in South Carolina, culminating in the CC Oral History Project. Through a study of diverse oral traditions, the history and politics of public education in South Carolina, and narrative inquiry and analysis, honors students examined the history, significance, and methodology of recording oral histories with a particular focus on race in education across South Carolina. In this roundtable discussion, we aim to explore the outcomes of our pilot course and its implications for future honors course offerings with a focus on the inclusion of interdisciplinary experiential learning and the values, challenges, and ethics of having honors college students start and maintain an oral history archive. This discussion will highlight the use of an oral history archive as a method of capturing transitions and the social and physical positioning of students, including who they are as honors students and individuals. <p><i>Consistent with previous reports, the most recent survey of employers conducted by the Association of American Colleges and Universities revealed that critical thinking is one of the most important skills of graduates (AAC&U, 2021). It ranked second with 60% of employers rating critical thinking as 'very important.' Like most programs, the Honors Scholar Program at High Point University is deeply invested in developing our students' critical thinking skills. As a way to assess this development, we are currently piloting the California Critical Thinking Skills Test (Insight Assessment, 2023). It evaluates overall critical thinking skills and several subskills (e.g., inference, deduction). However, the development of critical thinking skills only matters if students are motivated to use them. Thus, we are also piloting the California Critical Thinking Disposition Inventory (CCTDI) to assess the habits of mind needed to apply critical thinking skills (e.g., truth-seeking, open-mindedness, inquisitiveness). Although the CCTDI provides a comprehensive assessment of these habits, the inventory is costly and requires a substantial time investment. Thus, we are currently examining the relationship between the CCTDI and a free measure, the Assessment of Individual Motives Questionnaire (Bernard, Mills, Swenson, & Walsh, 2006). This presentation will review program data that compares critical thinking skills and habits of mind of first- and fourth-year students both in the honors program and in the general population. We will also discuss the relationship between the CCTDI and the Individual Motives Questionnaire.</i></p>

<p><i>Euthanasia is the deliberate ending of a person's life to relieve suffering. This practice goes against everything many physicians stand for. In most areas, it is still illegal for a physician to perform euthanasia. Euthanasia has been legal in the Netherlands since 2001 and since then it has become legal in Switzerland, Spain, Belgium, Columbia, Australia, France, New Zealand, and in some jurisdictions in the USA. It is also legal in Canada, and the developing program is currently under expansion. The development of the modern euthanasia program in Canada began with Carter v Canada. In a unanimous decision, the court held that the criminal laws prohibiting euthanasia limited the right to life, liberty, and security of the person under section 7 of the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms. In June 2016, the Canadian parliament passed federal guidelines allowing eligible Canadian adults to request medical assistance in dying (M.A.I.D.). On March 17, 2021, the parliament amended and loosened the guidelines for the program. These changes immediately took effect and generated some ethical and ideological debate worldwide. Opponents have emphasized that euthanasia is now presented as a clinical care option in Canada and is virtually unrestricted. For some, this raises many concerns, but others agree that the right to die with dignity should be guaranteed. This panel will use the expansion of Canada's euthanasia program as a lens to examine more recent ethical and ideological debates that have arisen surrounding euthanasia.</i></p>

Speculative Fiction and Honors, Partners in Transition <i>Led by an environmental physicist and a Victorianist, this session explores how speculative narratives offer honors students valuable opportunities to address issues and anxieties surrounding the modern world. Just as Honors has undergone a radical transformation in recent decades, so has the genre and the perception of speculative fiction. At its best, it can serve as a bridge between Honors' past and its future. The genre and its spin-offs have long been influential in reflecting, critiquing, and re-imagining major historical and ideological shifts and discoveries—from war to evolution to climate—that changed the world. The panelists share their teaching and co-curricular experiences in the HTC Honors College at Coastal Carolina University to illustrate how mega popular fantasy realms, populated with vampires or hobbits or kraken, provide accessible avenues for students to thinking critically and reflectively about geopolitical, environmental, and cultural events in the real world. Interdisciplinary by nature, speculative media capture a wide range of student interests and programs of study; moreover, themes can be adapted to fit diverse faculty areas of specialization, as well as to develop related co-curricular activities and communities. Interest Group Programming in the EKU Honors LLC: A Discussion <i>Abigail Estep (RA), Kylie Perry (RA), McKenzie Carrier (RA), and Dr. David Coleman (Executive Director of EKU Honors) will discuss our system of "Interest Group" programming in the Honors Living and Learning Community (LLC) at Eastern Kentucky University. For the current academic year, our LLC has four programming "interest groups," each headed by a team of two resident advisors. The four interest groups include: Outdoor Activities, Games, Food, and Crafts. The presentation will include images and discussion of LLC events which we organized for the Fall 2022 semester and for the current Spring 2023 semester. We understand that many Honors LLCs at other universities include community service programming and peer mentoring. To be sure, those things are part of the life of EKU Honors, but we organize them through different mechanisms (peer mentoring through our honors orientation process, and community service through our honors student organization EHA, as well as service-learning honors seminars). In our institutional culture, we have accordingly found it best to focus LLC programming on extracurricular activities. Our unique interest group programming for the LLC is all about giving our students a fun experience while also helping them network and get to know their peers and professors even better. Dr. David Coleman will conclude the discussion with some reflections on how our LLC functions within the "big picture" of the life of EKU Honors. The Ins-and-Outs Of Serial Killers <i>The psychology and correctional treatment of those defined as "serial killers" spans across several mental illnesses, challenging developmental situations, and imprisonment strategies that are considerably different from criminals serving time for misdemeanors and petty crime. Psychopathy and sociopathy are the more notorious illnesses associated with serial killers, but there is more to the motivation and psychology of these criminals than what meets the eyes. In addition to how these killers developed through childhood and adolescent years, there is also influence from current media that either glorifies or paints different pictures of the crimes committed or of those who commit them. This can be exceedingly dangerous because the current populations consume vast amounts of online media, and on top of that, abnormal topics interests most people, which could lead to undesirable outcomes. Higher Education in an Age of Transition <i>Higher education in America is going through a series of challenges and transitions in the first decades of the twenty-first century. Some of the challenges - financial, equitable access, social justice, academic freedom and free speech on campuses - directly affect access to Honors education and student engagement in Honors. Three student panelists will discuss their research into some of these challenges. Access and Affordability As higher education creates new programs and initiatives, while continuing to support those already in place, we have seen a shift in the value placed on the components of higher education. As programs and departments try to defend their current level of funding, we see that many institutions within the realm of higher education have transitioned their funding distribution to reflect profitability. Correspondingly, we see that Honors education is suffering in this fight for funding. Diversity, Selectivity, and Justice In an age constantly striving for a diverse educational environment, college admissions is at the forefront of the process. With much of the landscape of admissions changing - through the current debate over affirmative action programs, holistic admissions, and the move to test-optional - the Honors college can be a bastion of both selective admissions and diversity. True or not, this perception has resulted in lawmakers attempting to forbid concepts that are deemed divisive through denial of tenure and even termination of "woke" faculty. Underrepresented Minority (URM) Students Overcoming the Challenges of Undergraduate Research at a Historically White Institution <i>The T34 Undergraduate Research Program at NC State has achieved success in its first three of years of implementation. The National Institute of Health (NIH) grant funded program is a collaboration between the University Honors Program (UHP) and the Comparative Medicine Institute (CMI) at NC State University. The program is intended for high achieving Underrepresented Minority (URM) students who indicate a desire to obtain a PhD in the Biomedical field. The students in this program face the same challenges that URM students have faced at Historically White Institutions (HWIs). These challenges include unconscious bias, microaggressions, social isolation, imposter syndrome, research and academic balance, mentor fit, self-efficacy, and the lack of developing a true science identity. Some of these challenges have magnified post-pandemic. As students begin to reenter the new normal of higher education and undergraduate research, science socialization issues for URM students have been exacerbated. Our program has begun to make inroads into reducing these barriers by developing diverse (UR and non-UR) cohorts of graduate students and undergraduates where these barriers are addressed in a safe and constructive manner. This contributes to a gradual change in culture and a reduction of barriers such as unconscious bias and imposter syndrome, as well as many others. From International to Global: An Honors Track Reimagined <i>In order to remove barriers to the successful completion of honors and broaden student interest in honors, Lloyd International Honors College has transitioned its International Honors track to Global Honors. As the student body of UNC Greensboro increasingly has shifted to students with substantial work or care responsibilities at home and students with completed associates degrees, the requirements for International Honors needed to be revised. Currently, common barriers to the successful completion of International Honors include the requirement to study abroad, the completion of a foreign language at the proficiency level (204), and the completion of thirteen credit hours of honors coursework. Global Honors aims to ease the curricular pressure of International Honors by making the curriculum more customizable and to mitigate the curricular, financial, and administrative challenges of study abroad by encouraging participation in other campus, local, and international experiential learning opportunities. The curricular load can be reduced by half: students are required to take seven credit hours of honors coursework in any mode and are required to complete a foreign language through the 102 level. Finally, students are required to accumulate 100 points of Global Honors Experiences. They can choose these experiences from a menu of approved opportunities including, but not limited to: additional honors or language courses, study abroad, community service, internships, developmental leadership programming, undergraduate research, fellowships, and conference participation. Building "Study Away" Programs in Honors: A Kugelman Honors Program Case Study <i>The COVID-19 pandemic canceled many study abroad programs within higher education. Additionally, for many institutions, any form of travel was not possible throughout the pandemic, creating entire generations of students who had little travel experience. After several years of this disruption, the Kugelman Honors Program at the University of West Florida decided to create an innovative solution to the lack of travel opportunities provided to students of the pandemic. Staff wanted to create a safe way for students who had not been able to travel to have an high-impact learning experience involving travel before graduation. From this discussion, we developed the idea for a study away experience, designed for students whose lives had been disrupted by the pandemic. After careful consideration, planning, and discussion, the idea became a reality. For ten days in the Summer 2022 semester, students and staff studied in Washington, D.C., giving students hands-on opportunities to explore the capital and think about how the design of the city reflects the American values. Specifically, the curricular component focused students on the art and architecture of the city as an expression of American national identity. At the conclusion of the semester, students were challenged to critically reflect on this experience in reference to their own identity. This workshop, hosted by staff of the Kugelman Honors Program, will discuss logistics, curriculum design, and lessons learned by this experience. The Application of Graphene in the Energy Industry <i>Graphene, a thin carbon allotrope, has shown promise in aiding numerous processes in the energy sector. New graphene technology is impacting energy sources like oil, gas, wind, and solar power. The material has a high tensile strength and stability due to the strong bonds between its carbon atoms. This strength and stability make its integration into the energy sector widespread with its number of possible applications constantly increasing. Wind turbine blades use graphene as a shielding agent against erosion, space technology utilizes the material in solar cells, and the oil industry uses graphene as a protectant during drilling. The allotrope is seen as having great potential in these sectors, with its greatest potential coming from its ability to be made into composite materials and thus the products made from them. Through investigation, graphene's potential uses extend into other aspects of the power and energy sector like transistor, battery, and supercapacitor production. In addition to its numerous applications, the material is used so widely in part due to its environmentally friendly nature. Carbon's presence in the natural environment allows for graphene to be implemented cleanly and sustainably. She currently leads the public-facing entity of seven FAS research museums, including the Harvard Museum of Natural History; the Peabody Museum of Archaeology & Ethnology; the Collection of Historical Scientific Instruments; the Harvard Museum of the Ancient Near East; the Museum of Comparative Zoology; the Mineralogical & Geological Museum; and the Harvard University Herbaria. In 2023, she was appointed the University's inaugural chief campus curator. In this role, Tindal has primary programmatic oversight of visual culture, historical signage, public art, digital content-creation, and responsibility for stewarding a more dynamic and inclusive interpretive ecology across the FAS campus—a portfolio of nearly 300 academic and public-facing facilities with 11 million square feet of usable landscape and structural spaces.</i></p> <p><i>Prior to joining the Faculty of Arts & Sciences at Harvard, Tindal was the founding Director of Education & Engagement at the International African American Museum (IAAM), where she launched its inaugural education, programming, and global outreach and community engagement initiatives. At the IAAM, she also played a key curatorial role—advancing the interpretive plans for the overarching visitor experience, content and media development, and scholarly review for the museum's eight permanent exhibitions.</i></p> <p><i>In 2003, Tindal launched her career at Levine Museum of the New South, where she was part of the curatorial team that organized the groundbreaking exhibit, Courage: The Carolina Story that Changed America, which was awarded the 2006 National Medal for Museum & Library Service—the nation's highest honor for institutions that make significant and exceptional contributions to their community.
